

Siloed information

Data is often fragmented, locked within single systems, and lacks interoperability

Opaque processes

Limited transparency in data provenance, methodology, and assessment criteria

Why infrastructures & services matter for RRA

Where principles become practice:

- Make reforms actionable and scalable.
- Enable transparency, interoperability, accountability.
- Connect research outputs, data, and assessment systems.
- Recognize diverse contributions (publications, data, software, engagement).
- Anchor reforms beyond policy cycles.
- Reduce duplication and support systemic change.

CoARA Vision

The assessment of research, researchers and research organisations **recognises the diverse outputs**, **practices**, **and activities** that maximise the quality and impact of research.

This requires basing assessment primarily on **qualitative judgement**, for which **peer review is central**, supported by **responsible use of quantitative indicators**.

WG: Open Infrastructures for Responsible Research Assessment - OI4RRA

Mission

- Enable institutions to move from proprietary infrastructure and research information, to open (interoperable) alternatives.
- Take into consideration the wide range of research outputs and open science practices, addressing the diversity of the research community.

Core Principles of Open Infrastructures for Responsible Research Assessment



RPO Action Plan – institutions leading the change

- Institutions are key in capturing and curating the full range of research activities — from software to mentoring.
- A set of actions for universities and research institutions to align local systems with the global open ecosystem.











RFO Action Plan – funders shaping the system

- Funders influence what is valued in research; by supporting diverse outputs and open metrics, they reshape incentives.
- A strategy for funders to drive systemic reform by embedding Open Infrastructure requirements in funding policies.











Newest output – report Transitioning to OI for RRA: barriers, enablers, and strategic recommendations

 Drawing on interviews with 17 experts across 11 countries, the report explores what enables, and what hinders the transition toward open infrastructures fit for RRA, highlights effective national and institutional strategies, and proposes actionable recommendations for sustainable and equitable reform.
